## Friends of Library Host FunFest Speaker

During 2013 FunFest, FOL will host Jay Erskine Luetze author of <u>STAND UP THAT MOUNTAIN</u>: <u>The Battle to Save One Small Community in the Wilderness Along the Appalachian Trail</u> for a lecture and book signing.

One reviewer (<u>http://meditationonmoneymanagement.</u> <u>blogspot.com/2012/12/stand-up-that-mountain-book-review.html</u>) reflects on the "value of this book: "This book is a case study. Whether your cause is the homeless, veterans, financial reform, or the environment, Jay's book offers insight into the tactics and perils of fighting for a cause. On the other hand, if all you're looking for is a good story told by a great storyteller, this book is well worth reading."

The details for this event are still being finalized. However, it will be either Tuesday (July 16) or Wednesday (July 17), probably around 6:30 pm. Mark your calendars now.

Many in Kingsport, esp. those involved with Southern Appalachian Highlands Conservancy or the AT trail clearing volunteers of Eastman Hiking Club, will know of Jay's landmark work to save Belview Mountain, Avery County, NC. This is his first book. The paperback edition will be released in June and copies of his book will be available for purchase at the event.

Jay Erskine Luetze was born in Virginia in in 1964. He now lives in the Southern Appalachian mountains of North Carolina. Trained as an attorney, he has become a leading voice for state and federal conservation funding for investment in public lands. He is a Trustee for Southern Appalachian Highlands Conservancy, one of the nation's most established land trusts.

## 2013 Great Decisions Discussions

Great Decisions, a series of discussions on our nation's foreign policy issues, will be led by a knowledgeable facilitator and offered at the Library in weekly 1-1/2 hour sessions on Wednesday afternoons, 1:30-3:00, March 20 through April 24, 2013. Many FOL members have participated in this program in past years and have enjoyed gaining a more in-depth knowledge of some of the top concerns in the world facing our country.

Kingsport Alliance for Continued Learning (KACL) and FOL will co-sponsor the series, and it will be an integral part of the KACL spring term of classes. Those wishing to participate in the Great Decisions discussions, including KACL scholars, are asked to register at the Library beginning February 11, and purchase (at the Library) the text provided by the Foreign Policy Association (FPA), a national non-profit, non-artisan group whose goal is a more informed citizenry. Cost of the text is \$20; no other cost is involved. Participants are expected to read several pages of the text each week and come prepared to discuss the topic. Discussion leaders are provided by FOL and KACL.

Great Decisions topics for 2013 are: <u>Future of the Euro;</u> <u>NATO; Intervention; Iran; and China in Africa.</u> Dates for discussion of each topic will be announced.

KACL brochures with curriculum and class descriptions will also be available in the Library starting February 18. The KACL spring term (March 19 to April 25, 2013) includes five other class series of six weeks of 2-hour presentations. Course highlights this spring include Histories of USA, Scotland and Railroads; The Economy of Today; Art Appreciation; Mineralogy; Innovation Failures; SW VA Coal; Hong Kong - Osaka Afloat; Lutheranism; Medical Myths and Lies; Health and Disease; and Native American Literature.

KACL, a partnership with East Tennessee State University, was established in 1993 to provide adults, regardless of educational background or age, with opportunities to attend stimulating courses, lectures, discussions and special events.

# Library Manager Thanks FOL for Gift

Thank you for the wonderful, super generous annual gift to the library this year. With this gift:

- The Kingsport Public Library was the first public library in the state to develop their own app. Patrons can now use their mobile devices to place a hold on a book, renew a book, download a free ebook or audiobook, check the library's events or scan the barcode of a book in a bookstore and see if the library owns that book and then place a hold on it.
- We purchased a self-check station which helps people in a rush to get in and out of the library quickly and frees up staff time to help people with the computers or to find materials.



- We replaced a broken microfilm reader with a modern microfilm scanner with a 24" computer screen which allows patrons doing genealogy research/newspaper research to not only view material, but to download it to a thumb drive or email it to themselves or others. The large screen provides a very crisp, full-page newspaper view with viewing enlargement features.
- We replaced 4 public computers that were six years old, using a matching grant.
- We hired a promotional firm to create a DVD to help us promote our expansion/renovation project (still in process). This DVD will appear on our website, will air on Channel 16 and will also be provided to donors.

I sincerely appreciate this annual gift. Several staff members remarked that the microfilm scanner is the best thing the library has purchased in years. We thank you.

#### **Survey Reveals That Future for Printed Books is Bright**

Book lovers, it's time to rejoice. A recent Wall Street Journal article reported that the forecast is looking bright for hardcover books. There's a place for both print and electronic books in today's world. They each serve a different need and complement each other well.

Pew Research Center released a survey that showed that the percentage of adults who have read an e-book rose from 16% ot 23% last year. It also showed that 89% of regular book readers had read at least one printed book during the last 12 months while 30% reported reading an e-book.

Maybe it's time to look at e-books as just another format. It's another option for "Read How You Want" that goes with paperback, large print and other types of books. There are book option to meet many different preferences that span all age groups. Kingsport Library is keeping up with the trends and new technologies to meet the preferences. FOL works with KPL to keep people reading, and each person gets to choose the book format that works for them.
